

Chamber Choir hosted the Toronto Boys Choir. Both choirs enjoyed the boys' beautiful performances at St. Francis Church and the school assembly.





The competition is very intense as both class A and B teams must compete for the same six places. P.H.S. team is a class B team.















DECA competitions en-

Regional competition was February 22 in Cadillac, and State competition was April 3-5 in Kalamazoo.










Runners Show Their Strength




A Building Season








One of the clubs most noticeable activities this year was their cheering section at home varsity basketball games. They dedicated themselves to showing their support for the athletic side of PHS.






Another strong year for Wrestlers




















It All Adds Up


