Few aspects of PHS academics can compare to the excellent qualities of the PHS Math Department. From teaching by a knowledgable and helpful staff, to the range of subjects offered, only a small number of students feel they can afford to end their math career after the two semesters required for graduation.

"Colleges look for a fairly extensive math record," comments Melissa Long (93), "so I felt I should take advantage of the PHS math curriculum and go further than just a year."

"I liked having the opportunity to take Calculus in preparation for the AP exam," added Dave Bowman (93), referring to the Calculus exam offered in May that allows students to challenge their skills in hopes of earning college credit.

Even students that don't choose to go as far as Calculus in high school find themselves fully challenged in the areas of Algebra and Geometry, as well as Trigonometry.

Whichever level math class a student decides to attend, he can always be certain he will be getting a quality eduction and the benefits of a helpful staff in the PHS Math Department.



For the first three years of their high school career, most students enroll in World Geography, Government and U.S. History. As seniors, some elect to take World History, or catch up with social studies credits in such classes as Psychology, which was offered the first semester of the 1992-93 school year. The required classes of the social studies department, History and Government, give students insight to how our nation was formed, the obstacles it overcame to gain the quality it possesses now, and how the government operates. "I knew very little about our country and how it's run before I took the social studies classes that we're required to take at PHS," commented Jinhee Pettit (93). Without the extensive class offerings in the social studies department, students would not have as much opportunity to be exposed to this information, information that's essential in living and functioning in our society.


"This year, as a senior, I particularly enjoyed being able to find out more about the cultures and writing styles of other societies in both mythology and AP Lit," commented an enthusiastic Kelly Smith on the wide range of English courses offered at PHS.

By taking Advanced Composition, many students at the junior and senior levels were able to prepare for the core writing courses most colleges require, and also better their essay-writing skills for AP Literature, a difficult class consisting mainly of the analysis of classic works of literature from around the world. Both Advanced Composition and AP Lit offer students the opportunity to earn college credit with an Advanced Placement Exam in May.

Students benefit from the PHS English Department not only in acquiring the communication skills necessary to survive college and the world beyond, but in the range of material they are exposed to and participate in, like forensics, journalism, and speech, each of these courses executed by only the finest staff members.

The Vocational Education Department at PHS offers students an extensive opportunity to learn trades and skills that will be of benefit outside the school environment. Art classes are offered at different levels, allowing students to advance from year to year. Drafting, auto mechanics, wood shop, electronics, business classes, and commercial foods are also available, and even attract the enrollment of students from other area schools. Such vocational classes give students a solid background to carry with them into a career, and provide skills used in daily life, whether or not they are career related, including typing, auto repair, and food preparation. 




Some of the exchange students participated in the International Club Exchange Student Weekend, helping entertain area exchange students that were visiting Petoskey.















That night was also Parents' Night. Between the J.V. and Varsity games, parents received flowers from their daughters.

The final record for the girls was 4-15-3. The team totaled 520 points for the entire season. Every girl got a chance to play and score.








