



All three of these organizations strive to help the community in their and together they really have helped to improve PHS and the community as a whole.



The meetings where held Mondays and Wednesday and were as long as thirty minutes to two and a half hours. Mrs. Lecky and Mr. Thomas hosted these meetings. The club had as many as twenty members and they could show up whenever they wanted. From playing the game to trading, strict rules were in play. Rules that make it fun yet had consequences. For example stealing was not allowed, if you stole you had to return the cards you stole and were kicked out of the club and were not allowed back in except by a majority vote.





# Calculating Numbers & Formulas

Math and Science are two of the core classes offered at Petoskey High School. They are both very important in High School education. Almost any job after college will take knowledge in Math or Science, so it's important to learn the basics in High School. Teachers are here to help students understand these thing and expand their knowledge.

There are different options students can choose to take for both subjects. Some students like to take the basic courses at different levels, and others choose to take classes that are focused more towards one topic, like animal science or environmental science. 



## Dancing in the Moonlight


A tradition throughout the school year
















