

The Petoskey's Wrestling room was added to the school a couple years ago. It has been used for wrestling practice and the occasional gym class.










Mock Shots






was Diamonds Are Forever. The prom king and queen this year were Seniors Andrew Meier and Sara Darga. All in all the 2007 prom was a very memorable night




















Making Music In the Streets




Working Logether Makes it Detter


Focus




Snot of Fun
