bout twenty years ago, through many twists and turns, JoAnn Astolfi ended up in her forever home in Petoskey. Since she prioritizes learning and community, her first stop was the library, and her love of the library has not waivered.

When Bell split up, she stayed in the manufacturing arm of the new AT&T and settled with a her husband and two kids in Bloomfield Hills. Her love of the library continued and her regular visits to her favorite downriver library in Wyandotte cemented her kids' love of reading as well.

She said the biggest difference between our small library and larger, more urban libraries is that "staff are more invested, they have their heart and soul in the job and use that to make things happen."

The impact the library has had on JoAnn has been lifelong, consistently giving her an environment to be inquisitive and to step out of her comfort zone, yet always a place that feels warm and safe. "Like a family or home, we may not always have exactly the same point of view, but we're always there for each other."

One of the reasons she feels so comfortable at the library is because "every age and every background is welcome and safe and can find a place to call home." She relishes the idea of all people welcome in the library because it truly brings the community together. JoAnn appreciates the Petoskey Library staff and their "intentional decisions and efforts to reach out and connect with each and every person." The library is JoAnn's community – kind, helpful, and always evolving.

Petoskey Film Series Returns in September

The Petoskey Film Series, which for years had provided free showings of movies at the Carnegie Building, is making a comeback starting in September!

"We are so thrilled to start up the Film Series after a long hiatus," said Jodi Haven, Petoskey District Library Public Services Librarian. "The Library offers a variety of adult programming and the Film Series was always one of the most popular."

Restarting the Film Series became a possibility when Bob Brill, executive director of the Little Traverse Civic Theater (LTCT), reached out to the Library to express an interest in the program. After several meetings, the Library and the LTCT had a plan in place and a schedule of movies lined up for the fall programming calendar.

Though the LTCT is a group that typically performs in the theater of the Crooked Tree Arts Center, Brill and



his group are excited to be working in partnership with the Library on the Film Series.

"Cinema represents areas of performing arts that expand beyond the borders of the stage," Brill said.

The program first began as the Petoskey Film Theater in the fall of 1992 as a memorial to Doug Smith and flourished for years with funding from the Crooked Tree Arts Center and North Central Michigan College. Eventually, the Petoskey Library took over the program and renamed it the Petoskey Film Series (PFS) with Craig Stutsky managing it for the Library. Stutsky continued to show movies at the Carnegie until the COVID pandemic caused PFS to be suspended.

The films chosen for the 2023 fall schedule are almost exclusively intended for an adult audience. Brill's interest in being involved with the PFS was not only to show the films, but to also engage in discussion about them.

"This series is intended to highlight films that create dialogue," Brill explained in reference to his choices for the movie line-up. Prior to the start of each film, Brill will talk about why it was chosen and following the movie, hopes the audience will stick around to share their thoughts with each other about it.

For the fall season, the series will take place every Wednesday with a start time of 7:00pm. There is no cost to attend, though donations will be accepted. Doors to the Carnegie will open at 6:30pm with first-come seating. Those attending may bring their own snacks.

The Petoskey District Library embarked on a construction project this past summer. While certainly not the best timing, it was imperative to the safety of patrons to fix the building due to the crumbling brick and stone. We are hoping the project is completed by November of this year. Plans include: replacing the broken snow melt system, rebuilding the collapsed ramp, repairing the cap stone work, and cleaning and tuck pointing the mortar and joints. Roof gutter repairs are also planned to hopefully put an end to the continual water leakage inside the Library.

While the construction project is necessary, it is not the most interesting of Library renovations. We have two other projects in mind: a dedicated tween space and rearranging the second-floor adult collection, both to enhance functionality inside the Library.

The tween population, upper elementary/early middle school grades, has no dedicated space in the Library. They are too young for the Teen Department, but don't really fit in with the little ones in the Children's Department. With grant funding from Women Who Care as the seed, the Friends of the Petoskey District Library have committed to help fund the rearranging of the children's room to do just this. We will have comfortable seating, floor space for lounging, computers, and activity boards. Watch for this update to happen by the end of this year.

For the second project, we would love to rearrange the second floor layout. Currently, the Adult Services staff is tucked around a corner, out of sight. We hope to relocate them to have more of a staff presence for assistance. This may even free up room for more public meeting spaces! We are currently in the dream phase for this project, but hope to find funding in the next year or so. Stay tuned for updates.

While the outside repair project wraps up later this fall, it doesn't mean we are done with planning. Continually taking note of the flow of patron use of our services and how to best meet their needs is always number one on my to do list. Thank you for your patience with the current project. Hopefully the next ones will be far more interesting and fun!




