ue Howe was a teacher from Romeo who retired to the Indian River community. Much of her family lives in northern Michigan, so she was pleased with the ability to be closer to them in her retirement. After some years, the time came when caring for a house was too much for Sue, and her kids had begun to worry about her being alone. Sue saw an opportunity to make her life easier and set her children's minds and hearts at ease with a move to a senior living facility. She and her family decided that moving to an apartment with more support services would be a positive change for Sue's livelihood.

After hearing about all the services offered at Independence Village, Sue settled on her new home choice and was able to move this past April. One of the selling points to her move was the Book Buddies program, a service of the Petoskey District Library, which she learned about on her tour of the apartment facility. Book Buddies provides bi-monthly visits, bringing books, magazines, and conversation to six different senior living apartments. While Sue has always been a reader, the selection that Petoskey offers, and the ease of borrowing have provided her with a never-ending source of engagement.



Sue would not be able to easily visit the Library since she no longer drives, so Book Buddies is a vital part of her life. She is thrilled that the Library comes to her! She reads more than ever, because "Mary, Petoskey Library Outreach staff, is able to find that perfect read for me, so I always have another book to open." Sue loves that Mary comes and talks about books, bringing new authors and titles from the Library to share. The companionship that Mary offers is one of the highlights of her day. "I am thrilled to see Mary and talk books," she exclaimed.

Sue reads more than ever and loves to trade books with other residents as well as help them find their next favorite read. Sue is currently reading *Indians of Hungry Hollow* by Bill Dunlop, and loves the opportunity to learn more about our local history. The Petoskey District Library adds to the livelihood of the Independence Village residents, especially Sue.

The Book Buddies program, partially funded through a grant from the Emmet County Senior millage, also visits American House, Harbor Village (Crestview), Pineview Cottage, Riverside Terrace, and Villa at the Bay.

Americans and the Holocaust Exhibit **JANUARY 5-FEBRUARY 14**



I am very pleased that we, the Petoskey District Library, were awarded an opportunity to host the Americans and the Holocaust Traveling Exhibition. Fifty library locations across the country have the honor of sharing the vital information presented in the exhibit with their communities. The exhibit is based on new research that was done to show what Americans knew about the Holocaust and how they reacted.

Sharing information about the Holocaust with our community meets several of our Library's core values, including driving discovery through life-long learning. The community will have the opportunity to spend moments discovering their personal thoughts in response to prompts throughout the exhibit. We are also pleased that ninth and tenth grade classrooms in the Char-EM ISD will be invited to view the exhibition with their teachers and a docent.

This exhibit has personal importance to me as well. I remember my cousin, a Holocaust survivor, always saying "never forget."
