






A Human Library visited

able to "borrow" a "book" and
have 15 to 30-minute sit down
discussions. The books were
actual people with an interesting
history, trauma, or story to
share. Some of the "book" topics
included: recovered alcoholic,
adoptee, and former extremist.

The building facelift project was completed. This project consisted of fixing the front entry, including the portico and the ramp; new heated sidewalks; tuckpointing the entire building; refurbishing the west end doors; and some Carnegie repairs.













2024 HIGHLIGHTS

Service Highlights

- The children's department did a bit of rearranging. With a little shifting and moving, the children's area now has a dedicated Tween area, for older kids (8-12 yrs. old) to call their own. The picture book collection was shifted to create Themes a collection to make finding kids' favorite topics easier. It's been successful with a 16% increase in picture book circulation.
- TOPO Nexus built Adventure Kits just for our community! People can now check out a kit on one of three themes: Bear River, Waterfront, or Downtown and go on a scavenger hunt type adventure to learn about history and science of our local area.
- Through a generous grant from the Emmet County Senior Citizen Millage Fund; and partnerships with the Mackinaw, Harbor Springs, and Alanson libraries, we expanded our BiblioBag service, a program to send library materials by mail to homebound residents. With these partnerships, we now can serve residents in the entire county.
- We are able to provide many products free for our patrons through generous community donations: COVID Tests (MDHHS), Narcan (MDHHS), period products (Sisters of Xi Epsilon), and food bags (Manna Food Project).





Event Highlights:

- The annual New Year's Eve event held in conjunction with Crooked Tree Arts Center saw a record number of visitors who came to celebrate. The Library hosted Paddington Bear, had a selfie station, games, Sticker Palooza, cookies, a S'more Station and musical entertainment from Jeff Pagel. The over 1,000 attendees all celebrated and enjoyed the 9pm ball drop!
- The spring solar eclipse brought 250 visitors to the library to collect viewing glasses, enjoy eclipse themed activities and watch the eclipse!
- Thanks to the Petoskey-Harbor Spring Area Community Foundation and the Friends of the Petoskey Public Library, we were able to upgrade the projector, speakers, and window blinds at the Carnegie Building for the Petoskey Film Series weekly movies and other library hosted events.



 We were one of 21 libraries chosen nationwide to participate in the STEM Tales program through StarNet. This granted program was looking at the effect of media read alouds, and literacy learning on young children and their interest in STEM careers.


Administration Highlights:

- The township millage renewals all passed with over 65% of the voters supporting the library!




