



National Honor Society

The Petosega Chapter of the National Honor Society was established in 1925, with Miss Beebe in charge as faculty advisor. The four cardinal principles of the organization by which the members are chosen are: scholarship, leadership, character and service.

Fifteen per cent of the class enrollment is eligible for admittance into the society, and this percentage is taken from the upper twenty-five per cent in scholarship. Of the fifteen per cent, five per cent is selected during the last semester of the Junior year, the ten per cent after the first semester of the Senior year.

Athletics

The physical education department of our school system plays an important part in preparing and training students for later life. From the rudimentary exersises of the grades to the competitive field of interscholastic athletics, this training has always been supervised by the best instructors that any school system could demand. The results of their work have been gratifying to the students and citizens of this community, and with the highest of praise should go to them the sincere wish for continued achievement among us. It is with this thought in mind that we review our latest athletic accomplishments.

During the past school year Petoskey High School has enjoyed one of the most successful periods of athletic supremacy in its history. The Blue and White can truly call herself a champion; champion in football and in basketball, for in these two, her major sports, she swept the field. With the titles and laurels that go with them she left no other schools in this part of the state with any claim to

top honors in Class B football and basketball.

The 1935 football season provided the first of the Northern Michigan championships won by our athletes. Confronted with a rigorous seven-game schedule, the team played smart, hard and fast football all fall and lost only one game. The campaign was climaxed with a thrilling victory over Traverse City, always our greatest gridiron rival.

The team spirit of everybody on the large squad was most commendable, and we are happy to yell "you're the tops" to every one of the boys who made possible

one of the best football teams Petoskey High has ever had.

The prowess of our basketball team this year added to our thrill of complete victory and stretched the ordinary schedule of thirteen games into a prolonged season that saw the Blue and White win the Northern Michigan Class B cage title

and continue on to the finals in the state championship eliminations.

During its regular campaign the team won eleven games and lost two, playing good basketball but not the brand of ball it was capable of playing. In the regional Class B tournament, held in our own gym, the fellows really hit their stride. They exhibited a smooth but spirited attack that overwhelmed their three opponents. Petoskey defeated Manistee 39-30, Traverse City 42-26, and Alpena 40-19, easily gaining top honors.

The team then journeyed to Big Rapids and played their first game in the eliminations for the state championship. They met and defeated the strong Alma

team by a score of 37-22.

With increased confidence and a more determined spirit the team then went to Grand Rapids, there playing Marshall and winning what tournament followers considered the most thrilling battle of the state tourney. The score was 29-28, and was decided by the official state athletic association point system after an over-

time period that was both heartbreaking and inspiring.

With this victory Petoskey won the right to play the rangy, powerful Detroit St. Theresa aggregation for the Class B championship of Michigan. We lost to St. Theresa, 29-25, but, as lots of folks would say, "that ain't the half of it." There was a difference of four points in the score, but those four points were the only evidence of St. Theresa's superiority over Petoskey. The game was a dead heat of competition at its best and both teams played each other as though they had met many times. No one witnessing that battle for the title knew which team would emerge victorious until the timer's signal ended the game.

Nineteen games is a long winter's pull, and sixteen victories out of nineteen games played is a fine record, particularly fine when it is considered that in winning those games the team defeated some of the best that the state had to offer in

basketball talent.

The closing of the past sports season marked the termination of the high school athletic careers of Ted Dombroski, Bill Bremmeyr, Paul Ross, Harold Johnson, George Jablinski, Bob Greenwell, Alvin Wakeford, Don Fochtman, Chuck Anderson, Don Geyer and Bob Du Chaine. They will not be able to give their services next year, and their abscence will be keenly felt.

In concluding our review of athletics we wish to congratulate and pay tribute to Coach Arnold Wolgast, who has been with us for six years, building the fine teams that represent Petoskey. Through his earnest efforts the reputation of Petoskey High as a school ranking foremost in athletics and sportsmanship has further been established.

The banquet, served by Mrs. Earl Preston assisted by girls from our economics

The music was furnished by Russ Byerly and his orchestra. Al 11:30 came the grand march led by Vernon Kemp and his guest, Eleanor Buell, and Fred Ernst and his guest, Mary Lou Searle, with the rest of the students and guests falling in behind.

The dancing closed at 1:00 o'clock, but more than that, the end had come to a J-Hop long to be remembered and appreciated by the class of 1936.

Speech Activities

During the past year Seniors have been very well represented in speech activities. Perhaps first, the debating team should be mentioned. The team was made up of two Seniors, Carl Peterson and Ernestine Emboden, and one Junior, Vernon Kemp. Enough debates were won so that Petoskey was able to enter the elimination series. As a reward for good debating the school received a large wall placque

and the debaters received individual pins.

After the debating season was over the local contests for speech were held with Bertha Mindel winning in declamation, Vernon Kemp in extempore, and Carl Peterson in oratory. These people were entered in the sub-district contest which was held at Onaway. Here, with seven schools competing Carl Peterson won first place with his oration "Youth Asks a Way out"; Bertha Mindel, second, and Vernon Kemp, third, in their respective divisions. The district contest was held at Petoskey, and, in competition with four other sub-district winners, Carl Peterson won first place. As a reward for his fine work Carl received a dictionary and the school was presented with a large wall banner.

Thus in the past year Petoskey High School, with the aid of Miss Baldwin, the speech director, has been able to win many honors and accomplish many things

in the way of speech activities.
