








The Pit Stop became a place to meet friends, and students and faculty alike stopped by before, during and after school to grab a bite to eat.






phs shows spirit at annual sadie

To wind up the evening, Crossfire made their debut guest appearance, much to the enjoyment of those that attended the Sadie.













In March, the annual "POPS" concert again was held and consisted of contemporary music and choreography.


Many of the singers also participated in the all-school musical "West Side Story." In addition, they attended and won many high honors in numerous choir competitions held state-wide.






planned for the FFA members was an exciting trip to Canada in June.














efforts unrewarded but appreciated




