
Culture Clubs




Its the end of the world, wait...

Magic The Gathering club started this year thanks to the founders Allen S. Mays(06) and Frank Ostwald (06). David Ross(06) the President of the club was happy to be picked to have the job. The meetings were held Mondays and Wednesday and were as long as thirty minutes to two and a half hours. Mrs. Lecky and Mr. Thomas hosted these meetings. The club had as many as twenty members and they could show up whenever they wanted. From playing the game to trading, strict rules were in play. Rules that make it fun yet had consequences. For example stealing was not allowed, if you stole you had to return the cards you stole and were kicked out of the club and were not allowed back in except by a majority vote.

Magic is no ordinary card game it's a compilation of strategy, knowledge, and aptitude. With fifteen thousand different cards for this game, no one game is ever the same. The cards also differ in value; from a common card costing about .25¢, to the most rare card (black Lotus), which can cost \$15,000 for a single card. 









"Guys and Dolls"









When it hits you, you feel no pain




























