

T3 Creates Opportunity for Teens to Shape Library Experience

Meet the latest update at the Library - Teen Think Tank! Or, what we call T3, a refocused group on a mission to best serve teen patrons.

T3 is an upgraded version of the former Teen Advisory Board, which began in 2016 as a way to engage teen patrons with the Library and learn directly from them what they need and want. Originally, the group operated more formally, even electing a president. Over time, it became more relaxed and collaborative, so the Library rebranded the group to better reflect what members actually do—think creatively about teen programming, collections, and services.

Members of T3 are drawn from frequent teen Library users. Meetings begin with conversation and pizza before diving into brainstorming prompts provided by Nisa Kessler, the Teen Librarian. At the first T3 meeting in September, discussion centered on what teens would like to see in the teen space. The group filled the whiteboard with ideas, demonstrating a high level of creativity and enthusiasm.

Orchid Conklin, a T3 member who is a junior at Petoskey High School (PHS), explained, "Originally, it was the pizza that enticed me, but the conversation and fun kept me coming." Tula Turcott, also a junior at PHS, agreed that the pizza was appealing, but recalled a conversation with Nisa about banned books that led to an invitation to join the group.

Both teens emphasized that what they value most about T3 is the opportunity to feel seen and heard. It is a welcoming, informal space where teens can share ideas and help shape the Library. They take pride in seeing their contributions reflected in Library offerings. The teen Library of Things is a notable example. Tula recalled feeling

disappointed that teens could not check out items from the adult Library of Things. Following this conversation, Nisa created a teen-specific Library of Things, featuring items based on T3 suggestions.

T3 members also play an active role in collection development, helping PDL stay current with what teens are reading, watching, and playing. One successful idea was to start a video game collection, which became so popular that games are now available on all three levels of the Library. The group also contributes to programming, such as the popular Boba Tea Workshop held last summer.

Our Storytime program will take place two days a week this winter, beginning January 13 in the Children's Program Room.



Some of you might be curious about all the repairs happening in the building this fall. Over the past few years, we've had recurring water issues — from roof drains and condensers to roof leaks and ground floor seams. I'm happy to report that those problems have finally been resolved, and the building is now dry!

Of course, water damage can lead to stained ceilings, drywall, and carpet—and even mold. To address that, we completed restoration work, especially on the east side of the building where damage was worst. New drywall, carpet, and ceiling tiles have been installed, and everything is now clean and dry.

You may also notice a new shelving unit across from the elevator. This beautiful piece, donated by the Friends of the Petoskey Public Library, now holds our "books on hold." It provides more space for materials, frees up the circulation desk area, and conveniently hides our book carts!

Community service is another part of the Think Tank. Typically, the group undertakes one project each year, with members choosing the focus.

T3 members have created fleece blankets for animals at the humane society and Valentine's cards for older adults. Many teens are eager to give back, and the Library looks forward to expanding this aspect of T3's work.

The group follows a mantra of "there are no bad ideas," encouraging open and creative thinking. Often, the best outcomes emerge when members build on each other's suggestions, demonstrating true teamwork

in action. Direct engagement with teens, listening to them, asking questions, and implementing their ideas, gives them a genuine sense of ownership in the Library.

T3 participation also empowers teens beyond the Library. Orchid noted, "The Library is more than just a building to hang out in. It's a place I'm a part of; a place where I can fit in and stand out at the same time."

Tula described how her involvement in T3 gave her confidence to speak in the community. "When I visited City Hall, I was able to comment on their park plans," she said. "Being part of the Library's T3 helped me learn to have a stronger voice in the

community—to be an active citizen. I love having a voice that actually impacts stuff around me. I'm more than just a person in the background."

Both teens agree that T3 is a welcoming space for any teen. They highlight that the group is a place where teen voices are valued and heard, and that those voices can make a difference for the entire community.

According to Nisa, "When teens see books they've recommended on the shelves or attend programs they helped plan, the pride they feel is unmistakable." T3 not only helps shape the Library—it empowers the next generation to see it as their own.






